FROM THE EDITOR

The Academic Year 2015-2016 was an auspicious year for the CSWCD. There were four major events that made this school year quite special for its constituents.

First, the CSWCD was one of the UP units given special recognition by the Lumads from Mindanao for supporting their struggle for justice. They awarded the Dean of the CSWCD, Prof. Jocelyn T. Caragay, a "tubaw" and declared her as an honorary member of their community.

Second, the renovation of the CSWCD building which was started in the latter part of 2015, is now in full swing. The purpose of the renovation is not only for aesthetic purposes but also to make the building structurally safe as well as PWD (people with disabilities)-friendly. The renovations are expected to be finished by the third quarter of 2016.

Third, the CSWCD was declared by the Commission of Higher Education (CHED) as the Center of Excellence in Social Work in December 2015, thanks to the outstanding work of the Department of Social Work. This was the first time that a school of social work was declared as such in the country since CHED was established in 1994.

Finally, our recently retired colleague, Dr. Judy M. Taguiwalo, was appointed by President Rodrigo R. Duterte as the new Secretary of the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD). Dr. Taguiwalo was not only a dedicated faculty of the Department of Women and Development Studies but also a former Faculty Regent of the UP System and an active leader of the UP Worker's Union. Beyond UP, Dr. Taguiwalo is known as a passionate human rights activist and a feminist. I am sure the DSWD will be in good hands under her leadership.

All these good news augur well for the coming 50th Golden Anniversary of the CSWCD in 2017.

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL WORK AS **CENTER OF EXCELLENCE** FROM 2016- 2018

The Commission on Higher Education (CHED) recognized the Department of Social Work (DSW) of the College of Social Work and Community Development (CSWCD) as Center of Excellence (COE) in Social Work effective January 1, 2016 to December 31, 2018. This is the first COE in the discipline and one of the most recent honors conferred to the University of the Philippines Diliman.



hrough Memorandum Order No. 38, series of 2015 issued on December 23, 2015, CHED declared all the 137 Centers of Excellence in both public and private institutions in the country. From this roster, 23 are from the University of the Philippines Diliman.

Furthermore, being granted a Center of Excellence means that the DSW shall "serve as potent catalyst in specific program areas needed for the development of world-class scholarships, nation building and national development".

According to CHED, a Center of Excellence is "a department within а higher education institution, which continuously demonstrates excellent performance in the instruction, research areas of and publication, extension and linkages and qualifications." They institutional are envisioned "to become centers of graduate education and research in their fields of strength."

CSWCD Dean Jocelyn Caragay congratulated the DSW and the entire College for the recognition and encouraged everyone to continue aspiring and achieving more. She said that this is a significant milestone as the College will be celebrating its golden anniversary in 2017.



DSW Professor and Chairperson of the CHED Technical Committee on Social Work, Professor Mary Lou Alcid said that the COE designation is both a recognition of UP, being the National University, for its work and initiatives in improving the quality of education in the field of

social work, and a responsibility. She stressed the importance of providing programs that would help other social work schools in the country and even in the ASEAN region in improving the quality of education, enhancing the capability of teachers, and producing graduates that will serve the people. As COE, DSW is expected to take the lead in uplifting the quality of education in its discipline and in its area of responsibility.

DSW AS A ROLE MODEL IN THE AREAS OF INSTRUCTION, RESEARCH AND PUBLICATION, EXTENSION AND LINKAGES AND INSTITUTIONAL COLLABORATIONS FOR OTHER SCHOOLS OF SOCIAL WORK

DSW Chairperson Prof. Rosalie Quilicol lauds the efforts of the members of the faculty of the Department of Social Work and also acknowledged the support of the entire College and the University in becoming a Center of Excellence in Social Work. She said that the challenge now is to live up to the title "center of excellence" by serving as role model to other schools of social work in the areas of instruction, research and publication, extension and linkages and institutional qualifications. She also underscored that DSW will continue to produce social workers who will serve the people and the country.

The Center of Excellence award was given in a ceremony held at the CHED Auditorium last 17 May 2016. Dean Caragay accepted the plaque of recognition in behalf of CSWCD.

To call my MA Women and Development journey a rollercoaster ride is a bit cliché, but my experience was really filled with extreme highs and lows. Just like the ride, it exhilarated me, made me feel excited, and left me wanting for more.

It took me 4-and-a-half years to finish my MA degree. I started out juggling it with a super toxic job, which rendered me a zombie during my early Saturday classes, but my professors understood my situation. In fact, they were the ones who helped me identify my disposition as a woman trying to find her place in the world. My professors have always been enabling, and that's why WD always felt like home. As a woman, our specific location in society is influenced by the intersectionality of race, class, gender, age, and occupation.

On my second year, a nerve on my brain ruptured, and as odds would have it, I survived. My doctor said that I have depleted my learning capacity by 20 per cent so studying would be a tad tedious for me. But then, more than ever, I felt compelled to continue my studies not only because I felt challenged, but because I understood that there's a bigger purpose as to why I survived such a catastrophe in my life. That purpose would have something to do with the community... with contributing to the betterment of women's lives, and helping in advancing their rights in my own capacity.

Armed with learnings from Women and Development, I am hopeful that I will be able to help in this cause. Now, another journey begins. And as I ride this one, whether it be a roller coaster, or a contraption throwing me to a hundred different directions, I will stay on and finish the ride, for I got my training from WD.

apat na taon dito, ngayon lang ulit ako napahanga sa kagandahan ng ating pamantasan.

Agad akong naisabak sa napakaraming babasahing libro, susulating papel, at field work pagkapasok ko palang sa CSWCD. Nailantad sa amin ng kolehiyo at ng field school ang napakaraming mga isyu na kinakaharap ng mga magsasaka, manggagawa, mangingisda, kabataan, kababaihan, at marami pang iba. Namulat kami sa kasalukuyang kalagayan ng ating lipunan.

Napakaraming pagsubok ang kinailangang lagpasan sa aking pamamalagi sa pamantasan. Sa pangakademikong aspeto, hindi mabilang ang mga gabing nanatili kaming gising para matapos ang pagbabasa ng readings o kaya sa pagsusulat ng mga papel. Department of **SOCIAL WORK**

he Department of Social Work is truly proud and happy to be the first Center of Excellence for Social Work named by the Commission on Higher Education. The recognition was given in December 2015, and will take effect from January 01, 2016 to December 31, 2018. It carries with it the challenge of living up to the distinction as a Center of Excellence i.e., demonstrating excellent performance particularly in the areas of teaching and instruction, research and publications, extension and linkages, and institutional qualifications. On the other hand, the challenge has always been posed to the DSW in line with the CSWCD mission of academic excellence in the service of the nation and the global community.

TEACHING

The undergraduate and graduate curricula are undergoing review and revision to integrate the developments in the national and global landscapes of the social work profession. For the undergraduate program, the proposed curriculum was already presented last year to the University's Social Science and Law Cluster, and the

Department is awaiting the decision regarding the required general education units before proceeding with the University approval procedures. On the other hand, the proposed revisions on the MSW curriculum are still being deliberated on by DSW.

A number of faculty members are currently pursuing their doctoral degrees namely:

- Yolanda G. Ealdama = Doctorate in Public Administration (UP NCPAG)
- Hazel C. Lamberte = Doctor of Social Development (UP CSWCD)
- Justin Francis Leon Nicolas = PhD in Social Work
- Florence Pasos = Doctor of Social Development (UP CSWCD)
- Jowima A. Reyes = PhD in Family Studies (Miriam College)

The Department continues to garner 100% passing rate in the Professional Licensure Examination in Social Work. In the 2015 Board exams, two of the DSW graduates were in the Top 10. They are Mhike P. Sanchez (7th place) and Alexia Joyce de Leon (8th place).

EXTENSION AND LINKAGES

All DSW faculty is involved in various extension work as officers or members of inter-agency networks, government advisory committees and non-government organizations. Specific to social work professional networks, Professors Rainer Almazan and Jowima Reyes are members of the Board of Directors of the National Association of Social Work Educators, Inc. (NASWEI).

Two DSW faculty, Professors Alcid and Almazan, are currently involved in the Master of Rural Development (MRD) program which was created and currently being implemented under a Memorandum of Agreement between and among the government agencies (Department of Agriculture, Department of Agrarian Reform and Department of Environment and Natural Resources) as well as educational institutions that include Development Academy of the Philippines, Ateneo de Manila University, UP-Diliman and Xavier University -College of Agriculture. The DSW faculty team is assigned to handle the Rural Development Perspectives and Rural Development Models courses.

Professor Yolanda Ealdama is a member of the editorial board of the *International Journal of Social Work and Human Services* and a peer reviewer of the *Asian Journal of Education*.

International linkages and collaborations were also undertaken in 2015 with institutions such as the Department of Psychiatry, College of Medicine, University of Tsukuba (Japan); Japan College of Social Work; and the University of South Australia. The University of South Australia is a partner of the DSW for its field exchange program.







Department of COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

he Department of Community Development focused its efforts on curricular improvement and strengthening its Field Instruction Program. The CD faculty and students also engaged in researches on emerging development concerns and in pursuing community-engaged extension and public service.

TEACHING

Student enrolment has increased over the years, with CD students comprising about 50% of the total CSWCD student population. The Department is also proud to have four (4) Magna Cum Laude and six (6) Cum Laude awardees for AY 2015-2016.

The revised Master of Community Development (MCD) Curriculum was approved last February 2016 by the UP Diliman University Council. The Department has also regularized thesis topic presentation and improved comprehensive examination policies and processes. At the college level, the dialogue on the integration of courses on Community Organizing with the Department of Social Work has reached a point of agreement and will be offered next academic year.

At the University level, members of the Department have administrative tasks in various University units and committees: Dr. Oscar P. Ferrer is the Director of the Office of Community Relations (until May 2016) and currently the Acting Director of the Human Resource and Development Office (HRDO); Dr. Aleli B. 
AWARDS

Doctor of SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

2016 DSD Graduates

he Doctor of Social Development Program has two graduates in the 2016 commencement, namely Zenaida P. Beltejar and Juliet Carolino. Since 2014, the program has produced ten DSD graduates.

Dr. Beltejar's dissertation is entitled "Caring for the Carers, Psychosocial Support to Humanitarian Workers in Coping with Disaster: The Case of the Philippine Red Cross in the 2013 Typhoon Haiyan in Tacloban City". The dissertation looked into the difficult experiences and stressors encountered by humanitarian workers and the capability of an organization in providing psychosocial support programs and services. As reported, the humanitarian workers "experienced great difficulty as a result of being repeatedly exposed

to gruesome scenes, dangerous situations, and difficult and physically demanding working conditions." Despite these difficulties, they were "able to handle and cope with the pressures and stress in their jobs on a daily basis" (Beltejar, 2015).

Dr. Carolino's Dissertation, "Social Development Realities and Practices Within Community Governance of Selected Coastal Communities in Pangasinan". analyzed the realities and practices of the communities with regard to resource management, service delivery mechanisms, decision-making mechanisms and the rights –based principles of participation, inclusion and fulfillment of obligation. The findings show that "the communities have their own articulation of social development based on their prevailing situations, realities, practices, experiences, mechanisms and norms" (Carolino, 2016).

UPDATES

INTERNATIONALIZATION IN THE DSD PROGRAM

The strategic goal of the Doctor of Social Development Program is "establishing the Social Development Program as an Academic and Research Center in the ASEAN and Pacific Region". This is in line with the CSWDC's vision of "Justice, peace and sustainable well-being shared by the Filipino people and the global community." The DSD program is also anchored on the assertion that the Filipinos have much academic values and resources that can be shared to others, as well as huge potential to learn from others. For the academic year 2015-2016, the DSD was at the forefront in pursuing internationalization activities.

Academic Exchanges, Lectures and Workshops

The DSD hosted the "Academic Exchange Psycho-Social Intervention in Disaster Risk Reduction" with three visiting professors from the Department of Disaster Psychiatry, Faculty of Medicine, University of Tsukuba, Japan, namely, Dr. Yoshitomo Takahashi, Dr. Yoshihiro Imamura and Dr. Sho Takahashi, . The academic exchange was held on January 11-13, 2016, with the faculty from all three departments of the CSWCD as resource persons. The three-day academic exchange focused on the sharing on psycho-social interventions in times of disasters, the Social Work Curriculum and Psycho-Social Intervention in Disaster Risk Reduction, Sharing on Action Research in Communities Affected by Typhoon Haiyan, the Integration of DRR in Community Development Education and Gender Dimension in Psycho-Social Intervention in times of Disasters. The visiting professors also visited the **BALAY** Rehabilitation Center and the BUKLOD TAO for Community-Based Disaster Risk Reduction Management.

Three DSD Lecture/Workshop Series were held with guest international professors and researchers. The first was a lecture by Professor Deby Babis, Ph.D., from the Harry S. Truman Research Institute for the Advancement of Peace, The Hebrew University of Jerusalem last April 13, 2016. Dr. Babis talked on "The Filipino community in Israel: patterns of migration and employment". She described the various facets of living

among the Overseas Filipino Workers and migrants: the lifestyles, joys and challenges of working in Israel. Pictured as a happy people, the Filipinos in Israel were shown to be resilient to socio-economic stresses as they brought with them support systems such as values, traditions, festivities, friendships and organizing.

The second was the "Workshop with Stakeholders on Strengthening Disaster Risk Reduction and Management in Philippine Jails and Prisons" held on April 20, 2016. The workshop was led by Dr. JC Gaillard from the University of Auckland, New Zealand. An output of the workshop is the recommendations and pathways towards strengthening DRRM in Philippine jails and prisons as inputs in formulating a policy brief.

Related to the above, is the lecture organized on "Doing Research in Philippine Prisons" held last April 22, 2016. The lecture was given by Dr. Andrew Jefferson, a Senior Researcher from the Danish Institute Against Torture (DIGNITY). Dr. Jefferson provided insights about the prison system in the Philippines, the constituents' relationship within and outside of the prisons, and the potentials and limitations of reform as well as his experiences and lessons in doing research in prisons.

International Publications Awards of DSD Faculty

Two faculty members of the DSD were recognized by the University for their international publications in a ceremony held last December 2015. Dr. Oscar Ferrer received the International Publication Award (IPA) for his paper entitled "Policy Reform and Governance in Philippines Health Regulatory System" that was published in a book "Developing Country Perspectives on Public Service Delivery" edited by Gurtoo, Anjula, Williman Colin. The book was published by Springer in India in 2015. Dr. Emmanuel M. Luna, the DSD Director, was recognized with three IPAs:

STUDY VISIT IN HANOI, VIETNAM AND THE SIGNING OF THE MOA BETWEEN U.P. DILIMAN AND THANG LONG UNIVERSITY

The DSD Program held its Fifth Study Tour in Hanoi, Vietnam last May 24-29, 2016. The study visit aims to provide the students with an opportunity to understand other socio-economic, cultural and political contexts such as in Vietnam, a socialist state. This year, the participants included six DSD students, one doctorate student from UP CMC and six master students in Community Development. They experienced what it



meant to have a "socialist-oriented market economy" as they saw and enjoyed the flourishing economy of Vietnam. The tour was coordinated by Dr. Pham Tien Nam, a DSD graduate of CSWCD.

The study visit was done in coordination with the Thang Long University (TLU) with whom the University of the Philippines has a Memorandum of Agreement for academic cooperation, research and capacity building of both institutions. The MOA, signed by U.P. Chancellor Dr. Michael L. Tan, was also signed by the Rector of TLU Dr. PhanHuyPhu. Dean Jocelyn T. Caragay of U.P. CSWCD and .Dr. Le ThiQuy, Head of Social Work Department of TLU were the signatories as witnesses.

In consonance with the MOA, one of the highlights of the study tour was the "Second Scientific Exchange on Social Work and Social Development" held on May 27,2016. Started last year, the scientific exchange was a venue for sharing research papers and frameworks among the faculty and students from the U.P. CSWCD and Thang Long University. he new academic year was a busy one for the Research and Extension for Development Office (REDO). Not only did the department conduct new researches and extension services to various partners in and outside UP Diliman, it also welcomed new faces and new learnings to further improve its services.

RESEARCH

For the academic year 2015-2016, REDO conducted four (4) major researches, both commissioned and non-commissioned. They are:

INSTITUTIONAL STRENGTHENING

Staff Development

To further improve their knowledge, skills, and services, the REDO staff held three (3) staff development activities. The first one was the Adobe In-Design Training for the new staf held last 1 February 2016 with Ms. Victoria Almazan as the resource person. REDO also held a 3-day study tour in the province of Bohol from 11-13 May 2016 wherein they interviewed the Social Work Faculty of the Bohol International Learning College (BILC) and visited various LGUs and NGOs such as the Bohol Federation of PWDs/KAMPI, Simulation and Therapeutic Activities (STAC) for Children with Disabilities and the Bohol Crisis Intervention Center for women and children survivors of sexual abuse. A Staff Development for Research was conducted last 26 May with Prof. Rainier V. Almazan as the resource person on Research Practices and Ethics.

New Staff

Edgie Francis B. Uyanguren is the newest extension specialist of the Research and Extension for Development Office (REDO). Edge is a distinguished broadcast journalist, researcher and



singer-songwriter. In 2013, he was the recipient of the 21st KBP Golden Dove Awards (Association of Broadcasters of the Philippines) for his creative work in DZUP. He was awarded by the 2nd Gawad Agong-Indigenous Voices in Asia Project in the Philippines (IVAPhilippines) for his exemplary reporting and analysis of peoples' issues. One of his programs was also granted a special citation in the 33rd Catholic Mass Media Awards (CMMA). Currently, he is one the anchors and producers of CSWCD's Sikhay Kilos radio program in DZUP. He also hosts a cultural radio program being aired in Southern Mindanao region every Saturdays.



STUDENTS RECORDS OFFICE

ased on the CSWCD Strategic Plan for 2014-2016, SRO's efforts focused on continuing the gains from the past year in terms of laying the groundwork for an improved student information and management system.

DIGITIZATION OF STUDENT RECORDS

- CSWCD Alumni List: The list of graduates from the various undergraduate and graduate CSWCD courses was consolidated from different sources. To date, there are about 3,000 alumni in the list, who graduated from 1953 to 2015. The digital copy has two versions – by year and by course.
- Alumni Tracer Study: The study aims to generate basic data from the alumni regarding their contact information and work status, as basis for information sharing and provide inputs to curriculum development. To date, the response rate is about 10% based on the alumni list.
- **Student Tracking Matrix:** Important data from the individual student jackets were converted into excel format to tract student progress. Updating of the graduate matrix is in-progress. For the undergraduate students, the student information from the current CRS is deemed sufficient at the moment.

Official Student Checklists: In response to checklist-related problems experienced by students, all student checklists are being reviewed and only one version of the official checklist shall be used for assessing student progress. The original copy is kept by the SRO, and duplicate copies are given to the student and the program adviser to track student progress. The student checklists also have a digitized version per department.


STUDENT SERVICES REMAIN AS THE CORE OF SRO'S FUNCTIONS


From admission, registration, retention, student awards and scholarships, student evaluation, re-admission, records management , and until graduation. With the academic calendar shift in 2014, there were adjustments in the SRO calendar of activities. Support services to student concerns are also part of SRO's tasks – student orientation, student organizations, Student Council elections, Tatak CSWCD Scholarship Campaign, Parangal para sa mga Mag-aaral, and information dissemination of academic policies and programs. The SRO website, cellphone number and Facebook account were activated for wider access by the college constituents and the general public. The SRO also provides support services to College and University concerns in terms of providing needed student information, staff development, and participation in its various academic and social activities.

UPDATES

Student enrollment, AY 2015-2016


For the past several years, enrollment patterns have been constant. For the first and second semesters of AY 2015-2016, there were 555 and 525 registered students, respectively. There are more graduate than undergraduate students, with a ratio of two graduate students for every one undergraduate student. More than 50% of the students are from the Department of Community Development.





Number of Graduates, AY 2014-2015

A total of 61 students graduated in AY 2014-2015, 56% undergraduate and 44% graduate students. Sixteen (16) graduated with honors: one Magna Cum Laude, 10 Cum Laude, and five Academic Excellence Awardees. The latter was given to graduate students who got a GWA of 1.25 for all their subjects. Figure 3 presents the distribution of students who graduated in SY 2014-2015.



Student Awards

For the Parangal para sa Mag-aaral 2016, CSWCD has 75 awardees: 58 undergrad University Scholars,17 graduate University Scholars, and 6 Social Work Board topnotchers.

Scholarships

For AY 2015-2016, a total of 38 students received various grants from both college-based and University-based scholarship awards: 60% got scholarships for two semesters while 40% got scholarships for one semester. The Tatak CSWCD Scholarship Fund provided grants to 19 students or 50% of the total number of scholars. (Please refer to attached list of scholars.)

CHALLENGES

AY 2015-2016 proved to be quite challenging for the Student Records Office. We experienced major transitions in the past year: staff composition, strict implementation of the academic policies of the University, SAIS preparations, increasing work demands brought by the academic calendar shift, challenges of digitization of student records, and limited work space due to the current building renovation.

- Leny Bravo, and a long-time SRO staff, passed away on 2015. Mark Francisco, also resigned last year. The office relied on hiring a non-UP contractual and volunteers as it took some time before the authority to fill the vacant positions was granted.
- We handled several problematic cases pertaining to the Hybrid GE Program, course substitution, maximum residency rule, missing documents and incomplete records, probable student disciplinary cases, students with behavioral problems, and harmonizing traditional practices vs. academic rules.
- The impending migration of CRS data to SAIS remains a great challenge for SRO considering the issues raised regarding its adequacy and appropriateness in responding to the demands of UP Diliman.
- The academic calendar shift also resulted to competing work demands and time constraints to meet schedules, especially the work requirements between the first and second semesters which coincide with the Christmas break.
- Digitization of student records meant additional tasks of archiving past records, continuous updating of current records, and maintaining the paper trail of student transactions. Digitization also requires corresponding technical expertise and adequate computer infrastructure.
- From room 107 where all active student records are housed, SRO has to move to the Office of the College Secretary because of the building renovation. SRO has to function despite the limited space for records storage and student transactions. The delay in building improvement schedule means that we cannot access all the records in the office, the records are exposed to elements during construction, and efforts for records filing/archiving are postponed until the office is ready.

But yes, we continue to hope for better things ahead: improved records management, timely information sharing, less toxic workload and schedule, more convenient work space, and more opportunities for growth.

he College of Social Work and Community Development Library supports the college in the fulfillment of its mission of attaining "academic excellence in the service of the nation and the global community through participatory, gender responsive, empowering and transformative development praxis." It provides its clientele with a rich, diverse and enduring source of knowledge to inform, inspire and engage them and support their intellectual and creative endeavors.

During the year 2015, the CSWCD Library continued to provide a modern, efficient and welcoming service to its clientele. The Library expanded its collections to meet the information needs of the people in a timely and efficient manner using information resources locally held, as well as from those published globally. It had noted an increase in its acquisitions by 207.27 percent or total of 1,902 volumes of books, theses, audio visual materials and journals during the year reviewed.

To increase usage of online library resources, the staff encouraged our students and other researchers to access different research databases and online publications subscribed to by the University of the Philippines Diliman Libraries such as: EBSCO Academic Search Complete, Gale Virtual Reference Library (GVRL), Academic OneFile (AOF), Proquest Central, ProQuest Dissertations & Theses Global, ProjectMUSE, JSTOR Arts and Sciences Collections, Readers Guide to Periodical Literature, SpringerLink eJournals, etc. This was expressed during library orientations for new students at the start of every semester and during requested orientation programs for specific research classes.

The year under review also marked the fulfilment of the CSWCD Library's intent to digitize and upload to IsKwiki its women- and gender- related theses as well as the Community Development and Social Work theses collection. It continued to work in partnership with the CSWCD's Research, Extension and Development (REDO) to upload one hundred and forty seven (147) digitized theses titles on Women's Studies and relevant fields which can be accessed through the college website htts://cswcd.upd.edu.ph.

For the year 2015, the CSWCD Library had performed the following distinctive accomplishments:

LIBRARY COLLECTION DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

- Acquired thirty-three (33) titles of new books and seven (7) audiovisual materials from the 36th Annual Book Fair held at SMX Center, Mall Of Asia;
- Received 1,399 volumes of books and other library materials donated by the Philippine Center for Agrarian Reform and Rural Development (PCARRD), Prof. Jeremias Leones, and the Filipina Center;

- Acquired new publications in the fields of Social Work, Community Development, Women and Development Studies, Social Development and other relevant fields;
- Developed library materials for blended learning;
- Purchased books selected by the faculty during book fairs held in July and September 2014 and 2015; and
- Coordinated with EESM, a company offering e-books and e-journals.



LIBRARY AUTOMATION

- Coordinated with the University Librarian regarding library modernization plan in preparation for the e-UP project which aims to integrate, interconnect, and harmonize ICT systems and infrastructure across all UP campuses to support UP's thrust of academic and operational excellence;
- Acquired two barcode scanners needed for migrating library inventory records from i-Lib 1.0 to i-Lib 2.0; and
- Migrated bibliographic information of books from i-Lib 1.0 to i-Lib 2.0.



To continue the CSWCD Library's effective and efficient service delivery, we are devising the following plans and programs for the year 2016:

- Acquisition of additional computer units for the CSWCD Library Cybernook;
- Coordination with the Building Structural Integrity Assessment Team regarding the installation of six air conditioners for the library;



- Acquisition of e-books and e-journals relevant to the college curriculum;
- Identification of fund sources to finish the digitization of theses and college publications and uploading them to IsKwiki;
- Continue coordination with the CSWCD Committee for the renovation and/or refurbishment of the library facilities such as: CSWCD Discussion Room, Field Instruction Program (FIP) Archives Section, the Doctor of Social Development Reading Area; CSWCD Library Cybernook, the CSWCD Learning Commons; and
- Procurement of furniture and equipment for these rooms.





ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE

he Administrative Office of the CSWCD is the central hub of the college. Its main role is to provide clerical services to the Office of the Dean, Office of the Secretary and the different Departments of the CSWCD, and ensure the compliance of the College with statutory requirements of the University. It also provides other related services, including personnel, finance, communications, transportation, procurement of equipment and supplies, and building and ground maintenance

STAFF DEVELOPMENT

The administrative staff had an annual evaluation and planning workshop on June 6, 2016. The resulting accomplishment report and plan report were presented during the College Annual

Evaluation and Planning Conference that was held on June 9 to 11, 2016.

The administrative staff had an annual team building held in Camiguin Island and in Cagayan de Oro City from July 21 to 23, 2015. A committee was created in order to spearhead the activity. Its members were Ms. Rosita S. Zamora, Ms. Mabel D. Orleans, Mr. Mark Angelo B. Francisco, and Mr. Jester Α. Magloncio. There activities held the income-generating by administrative staff, led by the team building committee. These activities were held in order to fund the annual team building. The first project was a fun run entitled "Wagas na Takbuhan para sa Kawani ng Bayan 2015" held on May 9, 2015. The second project was "Wagas na Tugtugan" held on July 17, 2015.



The team building activities revolved on nature conservation and historical context. The trips to various parks and historical sites provided the staff with various experiences that helped them learn and understand a lot of different ideas. The understanding of the past combined with the added knowledge of environmental conservation balanced the wisdom to be able to work towards the betterment of everyone. Moreover the annual team building bolstered the relationship among all the members of the

committee, further enhancing the communication among each other and ensuring a cohesive body that will be able to work even better together.

Another staff development activity initiated for the administrative staff was the Civil Service Examinations for professionals and sub-professionals review. This was organized by the Administrative Personnel Committee, and all staff which have yet to take the government exam was encouraged to attend. The review classes were held from March 1 to April 14, 2016. The resource persons were Prof. Lisa Victoria



V. Rosel, Prof. Aleli B. Bawagan, Prof. Wilfredo P. Awitan and Prof. Victor G. Obedicen. Nine administrative staff participated in the review classes.

Ms. Jo-Ann Golfo, attended the trainings during the 6th International Conference on Asia-Pacific Library and Information Education and Practice. These were held at the Philippine International Convention Center from October 28-30, 2015. She also participated in the 1st Librarians Summit: Addressing Issues and Concerns held at the University of Santo Tomas, from March 17-18, 2016. There are other training programs slated for the continuing education of the staff at the different levels of service.

EQUIPMENT ACQUISITION


The office was able to acquire several facilities and equipment related to student and office services and college maintenance during AY 2015-2016 Specifically these were the following:



Former CSWCD Faculty Dr. Judy M. Taguiwalo Appointed as the New Secretary of Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD)

resident Rodrigo Duterte appointed Dr. Judy M. Taguiwalo as the new Secretary of the Department of Social Welfare and Development. Dr. Taguiwalo was a CSWCD faculty from 1992 until 2015 when she retired from service. She is also a BS Social Work graduate, cum laude, of the college in 1970. In 2009, she received the Distinguished Alumni Award in Gender Equality/Women's Empowerment from the UP Alumni Association.

In service to the University, Dr. Taguiwalo was a former director of the UP Center for Women's Studies as well as a former Faculty Regent of



the University of the Philippines. She was also the founder and former National President of the ALL-UP Academic Employees Union.

A prolific scholar, she has written and edited numerous articles, journals, and books on globalization, poverty, women and gender, and/or social movements. Among these is her 2011 book, *Babae, Obrera, Unyonista: Ang Kababaihan sa Kilusang Paggawa sa Maynila (1901-1941)* which was published by the UP Press.

Dr. Taguiwalo is also a prominent activist. She was a political prisoner during the Martial Law years, and had been detained for more than three years. She was also among the organizers of the Malayang Kilusan ng Kababaihan (MAKIBAKA), a militant women's organization that marked the progress of women's movements in the Philippines in the 1970s. Her involvements in the social movement include being the Chair of the Women's Committee of the Alliance of Concerned Teachers (ACT); the Chair of the Board of Trustees of Ibon Foundation; a member of the Regional Council of the Asia Pacific Forum on Women, Law and Development (APWLD); and a member of the First Quarter Storm Movement and of the Samahan ng mga Ex-Detainees Laban sa Detensyon at Amnestiya (SELDA).
